The summer is gone. The Aberysthwyth Festival, Art in Clay, PotFest in the Park, New Designers, Art in Action, Earth and Fire... In the UK, and indeed around the world, we are now treated to an abundance of festival life. Potters meet and greet each other and the public; they explain and reveal materials and techniques; and they glory in the World of Clay. And the British Ceramics Biennial in Stoke-on-Trent will shortly be opening for its second season as well, with talks and exhibitions. As part of the Biennial this year Ceramic Review is sponsoring a new award – the Writing Prize. There have always been a few ceramists who write - Bernard Leach led the way here in the UK and Emmanuel Cooper, Alison Britton, and now Edmund de Waal, among others, have continued the tradition – but now we see more and more potters wanting to express themselves through words as well as clay. For instance Elke Sada, in her presentation at Aberysthwyth this year, included a poem she had written about her work. Perhaps this development is due to changes in the education system; requiring students to write about their work reveals to many of them that they have a verbal ability they may never have known they had. Or perhaps we are moving away from an underlying belief that words and pots just don't go together. Either way, we celebrate writing and welcome it into the ceramics fold! The aim of the Writing Prize is to encourage writing from makers and non-makers, indeed, from anyone with an interest in ceramics. We seek the insightful and the imaginative, whether it is presented as analysis or creative writing. Do consider submitting. Ceramic Review is eager to lend a metaphoric microphone to the voice of ceramics.

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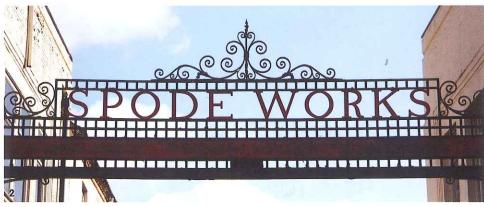

THE BIENNIAL IS BACK

The *British Ceramics Biennial 2011* takes place in Stoke-on-Trent from 30 September-13 November 2011. This six-week long festival was initiated two years ago in response to the region's historic relationship with ceramics, and offers an exciting programme of exhibitions, public interventions, and activities.

Events this year include several site-specific commissions: artists were invited to submit a proposal for a new body of work that responds to Stoke-on-Trent's heritage, industry, materials, and processes. The five successful projects are to be showcased in new, existing, and unusual locations across the city, including one, titled *Mould Store*, by ceramic artist **Phil Eglin** that sees him re-use and reclaim the discarded ceramic moulds from the nine remaining stores at Spode.

An exciting addition is A Great Wall, a large-

scale installation of modular units that will feature a diverse range of ceramics from tableware to tiles, bricks, and more industrial forms; the installation is intended to highlight the diversity of practice and innovation in the UK ceramics industry.

Other exhibitions include FRESH, a showcase of new ceramic work by emerging makers and designers, as well as AWARD at the Potteries Museum & Art Gallery, a major exhibition of work by artists, potters, and designers working in contemporary ceramics. Also, the work of ten international artists including Tony Cragg, Hella Jongerius, Betty Woodman, and Anne Ausloos, produced during residencies at the European Ceramics Work Centre, will be brought to Stoke-on-Trent for Sunday Morning @EKWC, an exhibition co-curated by ceramic artist Neil Brownsword.

CRWRITING PRIZE

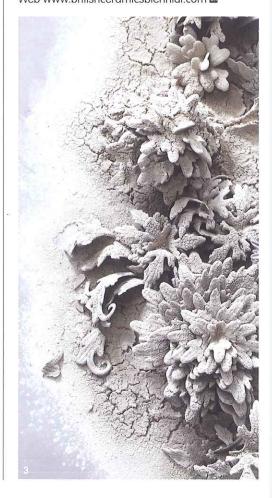

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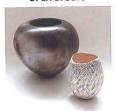
