

MADE IN BRITAIN The British Ceramics Biennial is part of the North Staffordshire Regeneration Partnership's effort to support Stoke-on-Trent's beleaguered potteries. In the past five years some of the region's most famous companies have run into trouble, including Wedgwood, Royal Worcester, Spode and Royal Doulton. The festival champions emerging and established ceramicists working in Britain, and also includes an international element, with an installation of traditional pottery from Gujarat in India (held at the former Spode site) and a selection of porcelain by the Spanish designer Jaime Hayón (at the Emma Bridgewater pottery). One of the highlights is Breaking the Mould, an exhibition of Dan Dubwitz's photographs taken at disused potteries earlier this year (the one shown here is of a store at Burleigh). Breaking the Mould runs until November 29 at The Old Post Office, 12 Wedgwood Street, Burslem, Stoke-on-Trent (breakingthemould. info). The British Ceramics Biennial continues until December 13 (01782-597083; stokeceramicsfestival.co.uk).



HIGH STANDARD The Finnish furniture company Artek (set up by the architect Alvar Aalto in 1935) and the Japanese fashion house Comme des Garçons - two companies whose coolness knows no bounds - have collaborated to produce a his-and-hers fragrance called Standard. Its ultra-simple packaging and fuss-free, mattgrey bottle are a reminder of the functionover-form aesthetic that Aalto worked to throughout his career.
