

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Getting Around

How to find your way to & round the city

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Getting around

By car

For the original Spode site follow signs for Stoke & Spode from the A500. These signs will take you to the Elenora Street side of the site. The best access is afforded via Kingsway, which has a car park. The satnav postcode for this car park is **ST4 1JH**.

For the Potteries Museum & Art Gallery follow signs for City Centre or Cultural Quarter from the A500.

By train

The nearest train station for the two main festival hubs - the original Spode factory site in Stoke and at the Potteries Museum & Art Gallery and AirSpace Gallery in the city centre is Stoke-on-Trent. The station is only about a 5 minute walk from the original Spode site and about a 30 minute walk from the Potteries Museum & Art Gallery. You can also catch the 23 & 23a bus, which runs every 10 minutes from outside the station and takes you to just outside the Potteries Museum & Art Gallery.

By bus

The route for bus numbers 23 & 23a is Stoke town centre - Stoke rail station -College Road – City Centre (Hanley) and so is perfect for all BCB venues. The service operates every 10 minutes and takes 15 minutes from Stoke to the City Centre (Hanlev).

The closest set down points for each venue are:

Potteries Museum & Art Gallery - Stop L on Broad Street Stoke-on-Trent station – outside the station Original Spode Site – Stop X on Glebe Street

The closest pick up points for each venue are:

Potteries Museum & Art Gallery - Stop Z on Bethesda Street Stoke-on-Trentstation - Stop F on Station Road (this takes you to Hanley) Original Spode Site - Stop L on Elenora Street

Ask for a PlusBus ticket on top of your rail ticket for unlimited travel in the City and Newcastle.


The Potteries Museum and Art Gallery is conveniently located on National Cycle Network 5 (NCN 5) and cycle parking is located either side of the main entrance to the museum.

Parking

The closest car park for the original Spode site is on Kingsway. This pay and display carpark is just across the road from the BCB entrance to the original Spode site. The postcode for Kingsway is ST4 1JH.

The Potteries Museum & Art Gallery has no on-site parking, however there are several car parks within a short walking distance of the museum and parking meters on Bethesda Street and Warner Street. See the map for locations.

Getting to the city

Air Well over 100 airlines fly into regional airports within a one hour transfer, so for more information about flights and transfer rail links to Stoke-on-Trent, visit Manchester International Airport, Liverpool John Lennon Airport, Birmingham Airport and East Midlands Airport.

Train Stoke-on-Trent is a major intercity rail route, directly linked to Manchester (35 minutes), Birmingham (45 minutes) and London (90 minutes). <u>Mrgin Trains</u> and Cross Country operate high-speed trains. Local and regional services are provided by Northern Rail and London Midland. For information on tickets and timetables visit National Rail.

Road

The M6 motorway connects into the city through major dual-carriageways. Usit Google Maps, to find how to get to the festival from where you are.

We're were looking for up to 50 volunteers to help us out with the 2011 festival - and we had a great response. Some of the opportunities are listed below - we'll want to do it all again in 2013.

In 2009 we had a great team of volunteers working in a variety of roles at a number of different venues. This year we only need volunteers to work at the former Spode factory site where many of the exhibitions and events will take place.

We need volunteers to cover a range of different roles primarily from September through to November, but there are some opportunities starting in July. Ideally you will be available to cover a number of sessions per week, particularly during the festival (each session is 4 hours). Training and induction will be provided as well as BCB branded vests. Reasonable travel expenses will be covered.

The following volunteer roles are available:

Exhibition Assistants 15 September - 18 November

General installation activity taking place at the former Spode factory site. Volunteers will be required to work with the BCB technician and artists to clear sites and install exhibitions.

Marketing & Press Assistants 25 July - 18 November

Support the marketing team in the delivery of marketing activity including print distribution across Stoke-on-Trent, venue liaison, inputting data, sending out information to the public, uploading information to the website, asking the public to complete questionnaires at venues. Also to assist the BCB's press team: Colman Getty and Stoke City Council's Press Officer in supporting the Press Preview and journalist visits.

Front of House Assistants 29 September - 13 November

Supporting the festival team in the delivery of the visitor welcome and stewarding at the former Spode factory site, and across the three Open Weekends: 1-2 October, 22-23 October, 12-13 November. Tasks will include helping with the set up of the opening night event (and any other relevant events), guiding visitors around the site, handing out information and talking to the public about all aspects of the Biennial.

Invigilators 30 September -13 November


Invigilators are required to oversee several BCB exhibitions from 10am-6pm daily. Volunteers can be rotated around different parts of the former Spode factory site. Responsibilities will include: monitoring daily visitor numbers, meeting and greeting the public, answering queries, telling them about the BCB, ensuring safety of artworks,



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


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The Festival

About the British Ceramics Biennial 2011

BCB showcases excellence and the best of contemporary practice by makers and artists across the UK, building significant partnerships with other major festivals and centres for ceramic research, and making significant European partnerships.

At the heart of the British Ceramics Biennial is **AWARD** at the Potteries Museum & Att Gallery, a major exhibition of work by artists, potters and designers working at the creative leading edge of contemporary ceramics practice. From the 28 finalists exhibited, one winner will be awarded a £10,000 prize. We're delighted to welcome <u>Spode</u>, part of the <u>Portmetrion Group</u>, as the sponsor of this Award, and also the Spode Room, making them our leading sponsor partner in 2011.

On the historic listed site of the original Spode Pottery factory in Stoke Town, **FRESH** will showcase the work of 40 recent UK graduates. **FRESH** will also highlight the Crafts Council's "Firing Up" project to re-invigorate the learning of ceramics in secondary schools. ReFRESH will showcase examples of ground-breaking ceramic research.

One of the largest shop floors at the original Spode site will be the home of **A Great Wall**. This large-scale installation will feature tableware to technical ceramics, highlighting the diversity, innovation and creativity of the UK ceramic industry.

Anew body of work by acclaimed ceramic artist **Phil Eglin**, *Mould Store* will see the artist re-use and reclaim the discarded ceramic moulds from the nine remaining stores at the original Spode site. Eglin joins five other artists who will create specific responses to the factory buildings to allow visitors to explore the ten-acre site.

The work of ten international artists including Tony Cragg, Hella Jongerus, Betty Woodman and Anne Ausioos, produced during residencies at the European Ceramics Work Centre, will be brought to Stoke-on-Trent for **Sunday Morning @EKWC**. The exhibition is co-curated by Neil Brownsword, an internationally acclaimed artist from Stoke-on-Trent and winner of the overall 2009 BCB Award.

OPEN will see the area's museums, galleries and ceramic industries with their own programme across three weekends during the festival.

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Biennial a major success for Stoke-on-Trent

The British Ceramics Biennial announces its evaluation findings today (7 March), proving that the Biennial was a major success for Stoke-on-Trent.

Findings from independent research conducted by Audiences Central and Earthen Lamp, using Cultural Olympiad West Mdlands's newly developed Economic Impact Toolkit for events and activities, show that last year's Festival:

- \cdot Attracted 35,000 visitors to the three main festival venues in Stoke-on-Trent
- · Generated £2.08m worth of economic activity in the city
- · Achieved approx £1.2m worth of media coverage
- Enabled over 700 adults and over 200 schoolchildren to participate in workshops and activities

Cllr Mark Meredith, cabinet member for economic development for Stoke-on-Trent City Council stated:



Winner of first FRESH bursary announced

Ceramic artist Lawrence Epps was last night, 10 November, awarded the first FRESH bursary at the British Ceramics Biennial. He was selected as winner from 40 other emerging artists showing their work in FRESH.

This unique bursary has been provided by Emma Bridgewater and EKWC, and will provide Lawrence with a three-month residency opportunity at EKWC, the internationally renowned ceramics centre in The Netherlands. Lawrence, who was surprised and delighted to receive the prize, has said he will use his time at the EKWC to develop his practice technically, creatively and professionally, building on the success of his 'Human Resources' installation at the FRESH exhibition.

The film focuses on the making of Spode's Blue Italian taking place at Portmeirion Group's factory in Stoke-on-Trent today. The film evidences the 22 pairs of hands through which each piece passes in its production life cycle and records the movements and rhythms of thw workplace and the making process.

Tristram Hunt MP revealed as Blue (Italian) fan

17 October 2011

At the recent Award reception at the prestigious Potters' Club in Stoke-on-Trent, an audience of 100 key ceramic artists, academics and industry players gathered to find out who won the £10,000 Award. Phoebe Cummings' extraordinary work took the prize, but the evening also saw an electrifying speech and rallying call to the industry from Stoke-on-Trent Central MP Tristram Hunt.

Here are just a few quotes:

"This great event needs to be as much part of the cultural calendar as the Hay-on-Wye Literary Festival, or the Edinburgh Festival, or London Fashion Week. Stoke in October must mean the Biennial and I'm very grateful to Barney and the BCB team for putting on such a great show - right across the city."

"To my mind, the ceramics industry in Stoke-on-Trent is in a stronger position today than it has been for a number of years... the successful firms we see around us have invested in clean technology, in innovation and - just as importantly - in design. Because what 'Made in Stafforshire' and 'Made in Stoke-on-Trent' is all about is the authenticity of production, the heritage, but also the quality of design."

"We need artists, inventors, innovators and entrepreneurs to know that Stoke-on-Trent is a creative and productive place to work. There are very few cities' names after their indigenous industry. 'Notor City Detroit is one of them, and so too is The Potteries. We should be intensely proud of that title and make sure we continue to live up to it."

"I hope that the success of this year's Biennial ensures its future for many years to come."

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
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Award winner announced

In a wonderful evening at the Potters' Club, the winner of the 2011 Spode Award was announced in front of a gathering of artists, sponsors, partners and friends of the Biennial.

After much debate within the judging panel a decision was made. The official duties fell to Mchael Haynes, Managing Director of the Portmeirion Group, who presented the award to a stunned and delighted Phoebe Cummings. The Award is sponsored by Spode, part of the Pormeirion Group.

Special guest speaker Tristram Hunt MP (Stoke-on-Trent Central) spoke eloquently of the city's ceramic heritage, but also of a positive future, led by design and innovation, epitomised by the work of the 23 Award artists.

Award continues at The Potteries Museum & Art Gallery until 13 November.

The British Ceramics Biennial is urging artists, companies and designers to submit functional ceramics to go on display as part of a celebration of city pottery.

The Open Shelf exhibition, part of the BCB programme of events celebrating the ceramic industry in Stoke-on-Trent, will be held at the original Spode factory site, in Elenora Street, Stoke Town.

The event will run from 30 September to 13 November and focus on any functional ceramics from plates and mugs to serving dishes and utensils.

Barney Hare Duke co-director of BCB said: "The open shelf is a new element for this year's biennial. It gives us a great chance to show the variety and energy of what is going on the region across the spectrum of ceramic producers".

Anybody currently living or working in the West Mdlands can submit up to five pieces of ceramics to be included in the wall of pottery collections, demonstrating the breadth and extent of ceramic practice in the area.

Open Shelf is a partnership between BCB and the Ceramics Industry Forum (CIF) that provides support and practical help to ceramic companies. The non-profit making organisation is dedicated to supporting UK manufacturers and promoting the ceramic industry in Staffordshire to a wider audience.

Sue Evans of CIF said: "The Open Shelf exhibition is an exciting opportunity for companies to showcase the best of British ceramic products, designed and manufactured by companies who operate successfully in niche markets in the UK and throughout the world. CIF is delighted to be a partner in the British Ceramics Biennial and to play a part in promoting the Ceramic Industry in this high profile event".

The work will be showcased in the historic original Spode site, which was acquired by the city council when the company went in to administration in 2009. The Spode brand continues to live on since local firm Portmeirion took over the brand.

The use of the heritage buildings for BCB will be one of the first times that the historic former pottery factory has been used since the company went into administration.

Councillor Mark Meredith, Stoke-on-Trent City Council cabinet member for economic development, said: "Spode has such an abundance of heritage appeal and it is fitting that such an exhibition of ceramic work celebrating the area's long standing, and indeed future connections with the pottery industry is being held at this historic site. It is just the kind of temporary use that the city council is looking for as work is underway on long-term proposals for the regeneration of the town and the historic site."

The British Ceramics Biennial Ltd is funded by Stoke-on-Trent City Council, Arts Council England and the Paul Hamlyn Foundation.






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British Ceramics Biennial 2011

09 June 2011

The British Ceramics Biennial returns to Stoke-on-Trent this autumn. Building on the success of the inaugural festival in 2009, this international cultural event, taking place from 30 September to 13 November, will continue to present the very best in contemporary ceramics. Six weeks of city-wide celebrations will include exhibitions, site-specific installations, artist residencies and creative responses to the region's industrial and architectural heritage.

The historic listed site of the original Spode Pottery factory will form the creative hub of the 2011 festival, with a mass of exhibitions, events and installations. Other events and exhibitions will take place at venues in the city centre, with a special programme of talks, seminars and workshops animating the festival.

At the heart of the British Ceramics Biennial is **AWARD** at the Potteries Museum & Art Gallery, a major survey exhibition of the best in contemporary ceramic design, practice and manufacture in the UK. From the 24 finalists exhibited, one winner will be awarded a £10,000 prize at an event to celebrate the Biennial on 21 October.

On the original Spode site in Stoke Town, **FRESH** will showcase the work of 40 recent UK graduates, representing the vitality of current emerging ceramic artists in an exhibition that makes use of the redundant furniture and equipment from the factory buildings as an integral part of the display. **FRESH** will also highlight the Crafts Council's "Firing Up" project to re-invigorate the learning of ceramics in secondary schools.

One of the largest shop floors on the original Spode site will be the home of **A Great Wall**. This large-scale installation will feature ceramic pieces from across industrial, domestic, scientific and artistic disciplines, highlighting the diversity, innovation and creativity of the British ceramics industry.

Anew body of work by acclaimed ceramic artist **Phil Eglin**, *Mould Store*, will see the artist re-use and reclaim the discarded ceramic moulds from the nine remaining stores at Spode. Eglin joins four other artists who will create specific responses to the factory buildings to allow visitors to explore the ten-acre site. Elgin's work for the Biennial is a result of the Artists into Heritage programme launched at British Ceramics Biennial 2009.

The work of ten international artists produced during residencies at the European Ceramics Work Centre, will be brought to Stoke-on-Trent for **Sunday Morning @EWWC**. The exhibition looks at the results of artistic experimentation and potential benefit to Stoke-on-Trent of a similar centre of excellence. The exhibition is co-curated by Neil Brownsword, an internationally acclaimed artist from Stoke-on-Trent who won the 2009 BCB Award.

An associated programme **OPEN** will see the area's museums, galleries and ceramic industries complement the Biennial with their own ceramics-inspired programme across three weekends during the festival.

Work by up to 25 shortlisted artists will be exhibited in the BCB Ceramic Awards exhibition at the Potteries Museum and Art Gallery during the biennial.

The Awards Selectors comprise the great and the good of the ceramic world: Ranti Tjan, Director, European Ceramic Work Centre (EKWC); Emmanuel Cooper OBE, potter, curator, writer and Visiting Professor, Royal College of Art; Alun Graves, Curator of Ceramics and Glass Collection, Victoria and Albert Museum; Kevin Oakes Chair of British Ceramic Confederation and Chief Executive of Steelite International; Barney Hare Duke and Jeremy Theophilus Co-Directors of British Ceramics Biennial and Directors of AFine Line.

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

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




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Tile Project

15 September 2011

Apartnership with H&R Johnson Tiles and Speight of the Art, this project will see children and families from across Stoke-on-Trent create artwork based on the theme of the Olympics for a piece of public art for the City.

Aseries of ceramic and design workshops will take place throughout September and October 2011 for people to have a go at creating their own artwork using a variety of printing and drawing techniques onto paper and clay, all around the Olympic theme.

The final design for the installation will be made up of hundreds of individual artworks created by local people during the workshops; from screen prints to poems, to create a unique and vibrant design that will then be printed onto a series of tiles using innovative new ceramic printing techniques by local company H&R Johnson.

The artwork will be unveiled to coincide with the Olympic torch journeying through Stoke in May 2012.

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
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Clay on Prescription

30 July 2011

BCB are working on this exciting project with Willow Bank Partnership (a community interest company that deliver a range of health service at surgeries in Longton and Meir).

The project will see patients from Willow Bank's Longton surgery work with an Artist in Residence for three months, learning a range of ceramic processes and skills, to create a unique piece of ceramic work for the surgery, all inspired by the local art of ceramic flower making, made famous by firms such as Aynsley and Gladstone. It's not just the patients that will be learning new skills as the Artist will also be working with Willow Bank's staff to get their hands dirty.

We hope that by participating in this type of activity that the patients will not only be learning a new skill and meeting new people but it will also help to improve their overall well-being.

This is a pilot project and we will be closely monitoring the impact it has on the patients that take part in the hope that it can be rolled out to other surgeries and/or health settings in the future.

BCB and Willow Bank will select the Artist in Residence through Making Moves, an artist development scheme delivered in partnership with Staffordshire Heritage and Arts Service and Craftspace.

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
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Artists into Industry

28 June 2011

We are proud to be able to present the work of two of the UK's most significant midcareer artists working in clay. Philip Eglin and Julian Stair.

Philip Eglin will be working with Spode moulds now lying redundant across the former factory site, although the exact nature of his engagement has yet to be finalised. We intend to install the outcomes of his residency in one of the Victorian mould stores. Philip's work is currently to be seen at Blackwell in the Lake District.

Julian Stair has been working in one of the Ibstock factories (near Walsall), using their brick clay to make his signature 'life-size' urns and vessels. This continues the BCB relationship with Ibstock that was so successfully manifested in the Marl Hole project in 2009. This new work will trail Julian's major exhibition in 2012 at MMAin Mddlesbrough.

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


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artists. An exciting "Art on Prescription" project making ceramic flower sculptures in collaboration with a patient group from a local GP practice will be launched during the festival in October.

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British Ceramics Biennial 2009

Overview of the 2009 British Ceramics Biennial

The British Ceramics Biennial (BCB) launched in 2009 with a festival celebrating and showcasing contemporary ceramics from across the world. Set in Stoke-on-Trent the heart of the UK ceramics industry, the festival took place in established venues and non-traditional spaces across the city. Highlights included a retrospective of Spanish artist Jaime Hayon's ceramics at Emma Bridgewater alongside forty of the best ceramics graduates in the Fresh exhibition; and Indian pots from Gujerat, India in Earthen Vessels. The Potteries Museum & Art Gallery hosted the Award exhibition with the coveted overall prize won by local artist Neil Brownsword. One of the festival's most popular shows was Marl Hole at AirSpace Gallery with an extraordinary film of artists' explorations at Ibstock Brick Ltd's marl pit. All this plus numerous local projects working with local people to create new work inspired by traditional ceramic techniques.

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

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
